The first MUN ever

The first MUN conference was organized by a group of students at Harvard University who wanted to learn more about the United Nations and international relations. The conference was held in the early 1950s and was attended by students from several colleges and universities in the Boston area. The conference was structured to simulate the United Nations General Assembly and other UN bodies, with students representing different countries and debating current international issues. The conference also featured a simulation of the Security Council, where students discussed and voted on issues related to international peace and security. The success of the first MUN conference at Harvard inspired the formation of similar conferences at other colleges and universities. Over time, MUNs have become a popular activity on college and high school campuses around the world, with thousands of students participating in these conferences every year. 
